Due: October 13

Character, service and leadership are the selection criteria for the Loran Scholar program. Loran Scholars are people of strong moral character who have demonstrated commitment to service and potential as leaders.

The Loran Scholar program is open to every graduating high school student from coast-to-coast. Renewable for up to four years, and valued up to &100,000, it includes an annual tuition waiver and a stipend of \$9,000, access to funding and internships through our summer program, invitations to annual gathering and forums, and one-on-one mentorship. To be eligible, applicants must have earned a minimum cumulative average of 85% in the previous three academic years and be a Canadian citizen or permanent resident. Planning for Post-Secondary Grade 12 Checklist

October

- Check your calendar...are any of your admission application deadlines comping up?
 TIP: Most of these application forms can be completed and submitted online. Apply Alberta is a great place to start. It is an online application system that will let students apply to one or more post-secondary institutions and authorize transcript transfers between participating institutions in the province.
- Continue to check and apply for <u>scholarships</u> from both public and private sources such as churches, community groups, the government or minority organizations.
- To get financial aid, you have to apply for it.
 Visit the <u>Student Aid</u> website to apply for financial aid, or talk with your high school guidance counsellor for more information.

<u>TIP:</u> Some post-secondary schools have separate financial aid application forms called institutional aid applications. Do some research and find out if this is an available option for you!

You Should Know....

- Your transcript must be sent with your admission application, so keep working hard on your grades!
- If you have to move away from home, start researching possible places to live or contact the housing office at the post-secondary school you plan on attending for more info.
- Check to see if you school of choice is hosting an Open House-many do in the fall, so this is a great opportunity to visit the campus and learn more about your program options.

Fall is in the air, and with it brings an abundance of squash. Embrace the fall season and these beautiful sweet gems in both savoury and sweet applications. Fall squash comes in many varieties including: pumpkin, acorn, butternut, spaghetti, and kabocha.

Types of Squash and Ideas to Enjoy Them



Pumpkin: The true 'classic' squash. Note: pumpkins for cooking or baking are 'sugar pumpkins', and aren't to be confused with pumpkins used for carving (which are watery in flavor). Cooked and pureed pumpkin makes a great addition to pancakes (pictured above). For a beautiful fall-hued smoothie, blend pumpkin puree with banana, orange juice and milk or non-dairy beverage. Pumpkin puree is also an excellent addition to oatmeal.





Acorn: With a delicate sweet flavor, acorn squash is best roasted. Also try it stuffed.





Butternut: Sweet and slighty nutty in flavor, with a deep yelloworange hue. Great in pureed soups or as a complementary flavor to balance spicy curries.





Spaghetti: As the name implies, this type of squash is a perfect substitute for spaghetti! Its mild not particularly sweet flavour pairs well with different sauces.





Kabocha: Also called 'buttercup' squash. Kabocha has a dark orange hue and is more starchy. Its firmer texture holds up well in curries, or roasted and added to salads.



Around the World with Squash

Did you know many countries have staple dishes featuring squash? Travel around the world from the comfort of your kitchen, with the recipes below. To get the full recipe, click on the recipe name.



Phillipinnes – Ginataang Kalabasa (kabocha squash cooked in a savory coconut milk broth). Served with rice.



Mexico – Pumpkin empanadas (pastry filled with a sweet, lightly spiced filling)



Brazil – Camarao na Moranga (shrimp stuffed pumpkin). A main dish enjoyed year round in Brazil. Made by roasting a whole squash, then filling with a layer of cheese, and a tomatospiced shrimp stew.

Zimbabwe - Nhopi

(savory porridge made with pumpkin, peanut butter, and cornmeal). A traditional Zimbabwen snack, that can also be served for breakfast.



Japan – Oyaki (Japenase Stuffed dumplings). Savoury dumplings with a unique cooking method – they are first pan-fried, then steamed or broiled.



Afghanistan - Kaddo Bowrani

(Spiced pumpkin with yogurt sauce). The spicy and cooling flavours in this dish balance perfectly.



Korea – Hobakjuk (pumpkin porridge with sticky rice balls). A popular dish in Korea, this comforting porridge is typically served for breakfast or dessert.



Italy – <u>Pumpkin gnocchi</u> (flour dumplings made with cheese and pumpkin puree). With a small ingredient list, mostly pantry staples, this dish can be easily prepared.
